**Religion 2356: The Qur'an****Final Project – Webpage Assignment (10%)**

Select a Qur'anic passage (in translation) of compelling interest to you and that is rich in generating multiple and varied perspectives, interpretations, etc. The passage may consist of anywhere between 85-125 words but should be no longer than 150 words. Design a Webpage that explicates and analyzes this passage. Your webpage will begin with framing the major question and/or issue you are investigating in relation to this passage and an overview/abstract discussing the passage generally. Include the text of the Qur'an passage. Relying upon at least one primary source and four types of secondary sources (see below), the webpage should **critically annotate key words, terms and concepts in this passage**, using hyperlinks and numbered endnotes, each cited properly. The majority of your annotations should reflect your own critical thinking, your own words and research. Lastly, you should establish a "Works Cited" page in which you cite and briefly describe each source used in the annotations.

**Research Sources:** You are required to use **4 to 5 sources** for the Evaluative Annotated Hyperlinked Pages:

- 1.) one primary source relating to the Qur'an and/or early Islam (e.g. tafsir, Hadith, Ibn Ishaq's Sira)
- 2.) at least one article or entry from a reference source with expertise in the Qur'an, (e.g., *Encyclopaedia of the Qur'an*, *Dictionary of Qur'anic Terms and Concepts*)
- 3.) one article from a reference source with expertise in Religion and/or Islam in general (e.g. *Oxford Islamic Studies Online*, *The Encyclopedia of Religion*, *The Encyclopedia of Islam*, *Encyclopedia of Islam and the Muslim World*, *Encyclopedia Judaica*)
- 4.) one scholarly article from a peer-reviewed journal
- 5.) one scholarly and/or academic book

Librarian Chris Nolan will conduct a session on information literacy that will assist you with this research. Librarian Jeremy Donald will conduct a session on information technology that will assist you with the setting up of the website.
